Lighting the Candle of Hope

As we light this candle, we reflect on all the small ways hope has taken on flesh around us this year.

Scripture Reading

Luke 4:16-21

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind,

Lighting the Candle of Peace

Peace is the gift of God that follows practicing care for each other and living with moral integrity. Prophets bear testimony to the barriers to peace among us. They chant faithfully in response to histories and present realities of racist violence, "no justice, no peace!" They echo the scriptures calling for justice and peace to rise and kiss. As we light this candle, we take a moment to reflect on an injustice that keeps people and communities from resting into the peace of God and calls us to deepen our engagement in the coming year.

Scripture Reading

John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it.

There was a man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him, yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

Winter Sermon Series:

<u>Un-Muddying the Water: On Being Baptist</u>

Many First Baptist folx feel kind of embarrassed to wear the label "Baptist" due to the actions of our siblings in Christ, the Southern Baptist. Yet, for good or ill, the stream in which our church swims is Baptist. Our congregation was founded in 1823, and although we were not initially Baptist, the word "baptist" is mentioned as early as 1824 in our records. That is our tradition.

Therefore, as we move toward our 200th year, we are thinking about what is good and worthy about our faith tradition and what we do want to hold onto as we move forward into the future. Join us beginning Sunday, January 8, as we kick off a winter sermon series: *Un-Muddying the Water: On Being Baptist*.

Sharing Our Stories

The central story of the Church is God as revealed in Jesus Christ. This story is what gathers us together each week, and it is the story that inspired people nearly 200 years ago to found our church. Each of us brings a unique set of life experiences, faith traditions, and encounters with the Spirit that shapes our stories and spiritual journey. So, throughout 2023, Pastor Carol plans to host in-depth conversations with different First Baptist folx about their faith. Stephen Hoell has graciously agreed to go first!

Join us on Sunday, January 15, at 10:15 am in the Parlor as Stephen Hoell and Pastor Carol have a 40-minute conversation about his spiritual journey! Carol has curated a list of about 20 questions to guide the conversation. Questions like: when was the last time you felt like you were standing on holy ground? Why do you stay Christian? What is a well-known passage or teaching from the Bible that you no longer believe or at least struggle to believe? Of course, conversation partners can always choose to skip questions they feel uncomfortable answering.
